ARTISTS



L. Brett Scott, Conductor & Music Director. Scott is Professor of Ensembles and Conducting at the UC's College-Conservatory of Music, where he conducts the CCM Chorale, teaches conducting and literature at the graduate and undergraduate level, and is Music Director of Opera d'arte, CCM's undergraduate opera company. Under his direction, the CCM Chorale has released two commercial recordings. The CCM Chorale has given multiple regional and world premieres by both American and international composers. Under his direction Opera d'arte has won numerous awards through the National Opera Association. Comfortable in front of a wide range of ensembles, Scott is in his 11th year as director of Musica Sacra Cincinnati. With Krista Cornish Scott, he is co-founder and co-director of Coro Volante, a vocal ensemble dedicated to the performance and recording of music by living composers.

An acknowledged interpreter of contemporary music, Scott is in demand internationally as a lecturer on Canadian music and has presented at several national and international conferences. He was editor of Chorus America's Research Memorandum Series, an Associate Editor of NCCO's The Choral Scholar, and currently serves on the editorial board of the International Choral Magazine. He has written for several scholarly choral publications and is a contributor to the most recent New Grove Dictionary of American Music. His authorized biography of composer, educator and soundscape activist R. Murray Schafer, titled R. Murray Schafer: A Creative Life was published by Rowman and Littlefield in March of 2019. He is a contributing author for the upcoming publication Choral Repertoire by Women Composers through GIA publications. Along with Dr. Gonçalo Lourenço, he is co-editor of four volumes of 16th and 17th Portuguese sacred polyphony, published by Scherzo editions.



Rachel Feldman, Apprentice Conductor. Feldman is in her final year of the doctoral program in choral conducting at the College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati, Ohio. For the past two years, she served as the Richard Wesp Assistant Director of the Cincinnati Youth Choir and director of the top ensemble, Bel Canto. An active professional singer, Feldman has recently performed with Vocal Arts Ensemble of Cincinnati, the Spoleto Festival USA Chorus of 2024, and Collegium Cincinnati.

Prior to her arrival in Cincinnati, Feldman served as the Director of Choral Activities at Connecticut College and Director of Choral Ensembles at Mount Holyoke College where she directed ensembles and taught courses in conducting, theory, and music history. Engagements included a commission with Tamar Muskal and the Borromeo String Quartet, Mount Holyoke's historic Vespers concert in New York City, and Fauré Requiem with the Connecticut College choirs and orchestra.

A Connecticut native, Feldman began her musical training with the Elm City Girls' Choir in New Haven. She has since returned to the organization on tours to Canada, China, and their summer camp. This is her second year as Musica Sacra's Apprentice Conductor.



Manami White, Concertmaster. White has performed both nationally and internationally with orchestras, chamber ensembles, and in numerous recital settings. Past teachers include Dorothy DeLay and Naoko Tanaka. White also serves as Concertmaster with Collegium Cincinnati, Kentucky Symphony Orchestra, Ohio Valley Symphony and is Principal Second Violin and Personnel Manager of the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra.

She is a founding member and associate artistic director of Collegium Cincinnati. In addition to performing, she is a member of the faculty at Xavier University. White has served as Concertmaster for Musica Sacra for over ten years.



Jessica French, Composer. French is an award-winning composer specializing in choral, orchestral, and organ music. Described as having "deeply impassioned, shimmering harmonies," her works have been commissioned and performed across the United States and abroad by ensembles including the St. Olaf Cantorei and Orchestra, the BBC Singers, the Choir of Trinity Church Wall Street and the St. Thomas Choir of Men and Boys (NYC), Downtown Voices and Novus NY, Choral Arts Northwest (Seattle), and the Savannah Philharmonic Chorus and Orchestra. Her works have been featured at national conventions of the American Guild of Organists and the Anglican Association of Musicians, on broadcasts including the St. Olaf Christmas Festival, *Pipedreams*, and *With Heart and Voice*, and performed in major cathedrals throughout Europe and the United States, including St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, several prominent U.K. cathedrals, and American cathedrals such as the Cathedral of St. John the Divine (NYC), St. James Cathedral (Seattle), and Grace Cathedral (San Francisco).

She is the 2023 winner of The American Prize for Shorter Choral Works and recipient of multiple honors including the 2022 AGO/ECS Publishing Award in Choral Composition, the ASCAP Plus Award and an Honorable Mention for the 2023 ACDA Focus Prize.

Her compositions are self-published through her publishing company, The French Press as well as through ECS Publishing Group, including the Dale Warland Choral Series and John Romeri's Cathedral Choral Series, and her carol *The Oxen* appears in Carols for Choirs 6, published by Oxford University Press. A native of Salt Lake City, French received her formal musical training at the Madeleine Choir School and holds degrees in Organ Performance from Indiana University and Yale University.



Euan Tait, Librettist. Tait is a European writer of Welsh-Scots heritage, born in Berlin in 1968, and now living in Gwent, Cymru. He works as an educator with teenage and adult students, as well as a librettist and poet. He is currently developing online retreats for international participation, and is writing two books on spirituality, Lord Who Am I? and Music Souls. His libretto work has been international, with composers including Kim Andre Arnesen, Carson Cooman, Anselm McDonnell, Michael Bussewitz-Quarm, Paul Spicer, Janet Wheeler, Paul Carr, Craig Hella Johnson, Mark Buller, Jessica French, Sean Kirchner and John Mulheisen. His recent major projects include texts for Cooman's 2019 oratorio As We Are Changed, for Spicer's 2014 choral symphony Unfinished Remembering (Symphony Hall, Birmingham, UK), and Arensen's 70 minute cantata The Wound in the Water (Nidaros Cathedral, Trondheim, 2016); more recently, major works include the opera Under the Greenwood Tree (Dorset Opera, 2024) and Princeton Motets (Princeton University Chapel, 2024). His shorter texts include Flight Song, performed and recorded across the globe. There is an increasing range of recordings of his work with composers available. Tait's work explores themes of human brokenness and memory, of internal and external exile, of music as our companion through life, and of hope for healing. PROGRAM NOTES

JESSICA FRENCH

(b. 1984)

Receiving

(2025)

I am deeply grateful to Musica Sacra and Music Director Brett Scott for commissioning me to write a work for choir and strings to mark the 60th anniversary of their founding. Because this milestone bears the depth and memory of sixty years, I began to ponder a question: What is it that sustains us as creative human beings, especially through the passing of time? Perhaps, among the many forces that guide our creative journey, there lives a passionate joy that we draw from: a joy that awakens, renews, and restores us. Given that I was asked to find a sacred text for this occasion, I turned to my good friend and librettist Euan Tait to explore the ways in which this joy can be received from a spiritual standpoint.

As Euan describes, "In our spiritual beings, we develop over time, a being open to the Holy Spirit, through Christ's renewing vocational force in us as our lives unfold." These words form the spiritual center of *Receiving*, a work that seeks to embody our openness to the beauty and vastness of God: a beauty that sustains, transforms, and renews us throughout the course of time. When I learned that the premiere would take place at St. Mary's Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington, Kentucky, I was immediately inspired to explore how this beauty could be expressed through the sight and sound of that magnificent space: the radiance of light through stained glass, the resonance of voices and strings, and the motion of color and sound, all converging in a living expression of divine beauty.

The first movement, Sweet Singing Sanctus, begins on a single F-sharp in the strings, representing a point of light streaming through stained-glass windows at dawn, slowly brightening and expanding as the day unfolds. This opening also depicts the soul's first encounter with music's divine presence, where joy, sorrow, and wonder all coexist. While treble voices emerge in "Sanctus" cascades, light fills the cathedral with radiant color and resonance, and at the center of this movement, the words "O Sweet Singing Sanctus" give rise to the Receiving Motive, whose harmonic turning, from a minor i to a major IV chord, embodies the act of receiving itself: an opening of the human heart toward the divine and a shifting from darkness into light. This gesture returns throughout the work in varied forms as a recurring symbol of renewal and illumination. Meanwhile, Euan's text turns to nature: trees flashing red and gold, and "living, rippling rivers" whose motion and color mirror this outpouring of cathedral light. The movement closes with the same F-sharp as the opening, this time sung by a clear soprano voice suspended above the texture, glowing in the final stillness.

While the first movement reflects on how beauty is perceived, *Alive as Fire* transforms that perception into motion and energy. Here, Euan's text speaks of stones turning to water, "sweeping through me alive as fire and ocean," capturing the movement of the Holy Spirit. Rapid canonic vocal entries mimic the sound of voices that echo along the cathedral's walls like stones in motion, while the elision of the words "rush" and "sweeping" creates a sound that embodies the text's sense of movement. As voices ascend and strings descend, their sound cascades and intertwines like flames rising and falling, depicting how God's beauty moves within us and makes us feel truly alive.

The third movement, Living Spirit, turns toward the human experience of sorrow and suffering that ultimately leads to renewal. To me, Euan's words seemed to echo moments of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection, which I sought to reflect musically. Opening as a lament, the movement begins with a descending bass line in the double basses accompanied by a steady ostinato in the cellos. Voices sing "We swim through the falling, scattering of stones," entering at different times to depict the motion of descent, which fades into the word "dissolving," sung by the tenors and basses. From this stillness, light begins to emerge, "reforming, tearing," as motion builds in the strings, joining the voices toward the words "remaking, alive!" The strings continue to surge upward, their sound carrying both anguish and joy, expressing the ache of surrender that comes with release. This gives way to the words "O Living Spirit and wounded Lord," tenderly sung by the choir, who then yield to the strings. As the texture slowly thins, the music rises gently toward peaceful renewal, evoking the dawning light of Resurrection. A semi-chorus repeats sung Alleluias, evoking the distant pealing of tower bells, while the choir responds with three sustained Amens. The strings slowly build beneath them as the bells slow and sustain into silence; a final gesture of restoration and peace.

FRANZ JOSEPH HAYDN

(1732-1809)

No. 14 in B-flat major, Hob. XII:14, Harmoniemesse

(1802)

The chronology of the three great composers of the Classical period—Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven—is misleading. Haydn's greatest works came after Mozart's untimely death in 1791. His work during the 1790s forged his reputation as the father of the symphony, string quartet, and choral composition. Returning to Vienna in 1795, Haydn was a wealthy man, celebrated across Europe. Prince Esterhazy commissioned him to write series of six solemn masses, of which *Harmoniemesse* was his last completed work, finished in 1802.

MORTEN LAURIDSEN

(b. 1943)

Lux Aeterna

(1997)

Born in Colfax, Washington, Morten Lauridsen was composer-in-residence for the Los Angeles Master Chorale, which premiered Lux Aeterna in 1997. He was designated "American Choral Master" by the National Endowment for the Arts in 2006 and received the National Medal for the Arts in 2007. According to Lauridsen, "Each of the five connected movements in this choral cycle contains references to 'Light,' assembled from various sacred Latin texts. I composed Lux Aeterna in response to my mother's final illness and found great personal comfort and solace in setting to music these timeless and wondrous words about Light, a universal symbol of illumination at all levels - spiritual, artistic, and intellectual."

FELIX MENDELSSOHN

(1809-1847)

Symphony No. 2, Op. 52, Lobgesang
(1840)

In the 1830s, Jakob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy worked on a series of unfulfilled symphonies, some completed and performed but not published, others performed and revised but never completed. In the latter part of the 1830s, he began working on a new symphony in B flat; he was moved to complete it through a commission to celebrate Leipzig's quadricentennial of the movable type printing press. Lobgesang incorporated poetic images and words from the Bible as well as "Nun danket alle Gott" ("Now Thank We All Our God"), the Martin Rinckart hymn popularized by J. S. Bach.

The first performance of Lobgesang on June 25, 1840 was met with an enthusiastic response. In a work that progresses from darkness to light, God's goodness is repeatedly suggested in a statement made by a soloist and repeated by the chorus. In November of 1841, the work was published as a "symphony-cantata." Shortly after it was finished, Mendelssohn completed the long-abandoned "Scotch" symphony in A minor, a secular counterpoint to Lobgesang. This marked a turning point for the composer, giving him the confidence to complete other abandoned projects from the early 1830s.

1. SINFONIA



OUR STORY

INSPIRED BY A VISION

Musica Sacra was founded in 1965 by the late Helmut J. Roehrig, who recognized that the tradition of performing choral compositions with orchestral accompaniment during church services had virtually disappeared, and deserved a revival. Inspired by this vision, Roehrig created an ensemble for performing sacred choral literature accompanied by an orchestra in the spaces for which they were originally composed, and at no charge to the public to ensure accessibility for all. Roehrig led Musica Sacra for 50 years. Our mission continues today.

A NEW ERA

L. Brett Scott was appointed to succeed Roehrig in 2014 as our second Music Director. During his tenure with us, Scott has not only honored and helped to preserve Musica Sacra's rich history of performance of familiar masterworks of sacred choral literature, but he has introduced our audiences to lesser-known composers.

Scott established Musica Sacra's Apprentice Conductor program in 2016, which provides graduate-level choral conducting students the opportunity to work with us as they continue their education. Nine students have successfully completed this program. More recently, Musica Sacra launched our new High School Choral Apprentice program, welcoming talented students from area schools that may not have well-established school based music programs. Our first program participant sang with us in 2023.

As a testament to Musica Sacra's dedication to our mission, we continued performing throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, producing two concerts recorded live at St. Boniface Church in Northside in 2020 and 2021, while following all recommended safety protocols provided by our venue and national performing arts organizations. These performances were streamed for 10 days on our website, achieving an international reach of over 2,000 views.

A LEGACY OF EXCELLENCE

For over two decades (and counting!), Musica Sacra has participated in the renowned Cathedral Concert Series at St. Mary's Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington, KY, now in its 49th Season. In keeping with our mission, Musica Sacra has performed in over twenty local churches, including St. Gertrude, St. Boniface, Our Lady of the Visitation, Our Lord PERFORMANCE, BASILICA: 2014 Christ the King Church and Episcopal Church of the Redeemer. Redeemer is our primary rehearsal venue, and the place we have called "home" for over ten years.



In addition to performing free concerts before Tri-state audiences, the chorus has presented concerts in historic churches in Germany, Austria, Italy, and Switzerland. Musica Sacra was awarded a Silver Certificate in the 2012 World Choir Games, which were held that year in Cincinnati.
